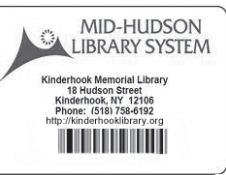

200TH COMMEMORATIVE YEAR

WAR OF 1812: FURY, FRENZY AND HONOR

SUNDAY, MARCH 4, 4PM

As the bicentennial of the War of 1812 approaches, both the United States and Canada are exploring its legacy of lasting peace. While there were no tangible gains to either adversary, the US and Canada both went on to expand and prosper.

But the war itself has infused our culture with dramatic stories: “Old Ironsides” and the struggles for naval supremacy; the significance of the Niagara Campaign; the defeat of Tecumseh; Dolly Madison’s heroism during the burning of Washington, D.C.; and, the perseverance of the people of Baltimore and of Fort McHenry, which inspired The Star-Spangled Banner.



The War of 1812 is sometimes labeled “The Forgotten War.” In this lecture by Raya Lee on Sunday, March 4 at 4pm, we rediscover and remember this conflict’s impact on America.

A graduate of Fredonia State with a master’s degree from the University of Buffalo, Raya Lee has served as Assistant Librarian with the

Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and as Music Librarian at the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library.

This lecture is made possible by the New York Council for the Humanities’ Speakers in the Humanities Program. Once each quarter in 2012 we’ll bring humanities scholars from around New York State to the Library for lectures on a variety of topics that are free and open to the public.

PRESIDENT’S MESSAGE

WORKS IN PROGRESS

The reconstruction of Hudson Street is complete thanks to efficient project management by Jim Dunham and professional contracted services by Bob Talham, Inc. and Spectra Engineering, Architecture and Surveying, P.C. New curb cuts that improve access to the new sidewalks on Hudson and Sylvester Streets, elimination of potholes, and clear designation of handicap parking spaces combine to help patrons reach the library more safely. Hudson Street now has 10 foot travel lanes and 8 foot parking lanes. While narrower than before, our new road will slow traffic and enhance pedestrian safety. The project also improves access from Church Street to the back lawn of the building, making it easier for our Friends of the Library book sales and OKtoberfest, as well as other popular outdoor family programs.

The interior of the library is about to undergo transformation as well. A renovation of the

children's room will significantly improve our ability to hold programs within the library's limited space. Mobile shelving in the children's room will accommodate story and lap time with much less disruption to the rest of the Library. The tables and chairs in the main room will also be replaced with furniture designed to be moved, making it safer and less cumbersome for staff to reconfigured space for programs and meetings.

This \$27,000 project is funded by grants from the New York State Public Library Construction program, Berkshire Taconic Foundation Fund for Columbia County, the Evelyn Bordewick Foundation, and the Stewart's Foundation, as well as by donations from library trustees and Friends of the Library and proceeds from the 2011 OKtoberfest. The interior work begins on January 31, 2012 and is scheduled to end on April 30. Please bear

with us as we maintain our normal schedule of hours and range of services during most of the renovation.

The establishment of a municipal sanitary district in the center of the village, a third capital improvement to our facility, remains in progress. The Village Board has not finally determined whether to proceed with the project. However, after weighing the many economic and sanitary advantages that a public sewer district would offer all village residents, the library trustees voted unanimously to support the project. Lack of public sanitation infrastructure has crippled past attempts to revitalize our village center. This project would correct these deficiencies. Village board action on this project is expected soon.

Library Card Requirement

Over 30% of the lending business we do at the Kinderhook Library is due to the network we have with other public libraries in the five counties of the Mid-Hudson Library System. Sixty six libraries across Columbia, Greene, Dutchess, Ulster, and Putnam counties work together to bring you the items you're looking for in as little as one or two days. Our libraries also work together to create sharing standards that are fair to all libraries and important for us to follow.

Because we have a responsibility to the other libraries in our system and because of concerns about patron privacy and our own accountability, beginning in January you must have either your library card or a photo ID with a valid address in order to pick up anything from the hold shelf. This is a requirement that is being implemented system-wide, so expect similar rules at other libraries in the Mid-Hudson Library System.

Registration and a Mid-Hudson Library card are required for each class and class size is limited to 6 students. A preference will be given to people who live in the towns of Kinderhook and Stuyvesant but a waiting list will be kept for other people holding a Mid-Hudson Library card who don't live in the immediate area.

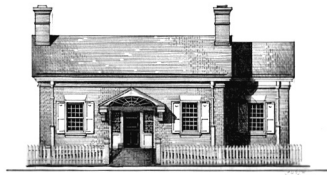
☛ You were Never Lovelier (1942)

Afternoon Discoveries

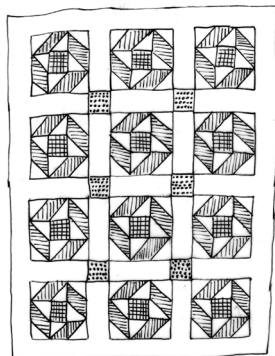
Afternoon Discoveries is a program designed for school-age children in second through fifth grade to explore a variety of fascinating topics through books and activities. Space is limited—registration is required.

Get Your Library Card Today!

Having a library card means you can have 24-hour access, 7 days a week to the collections of 66 libraries in the Mid-Hudson Library System. Just fill out this form and bring to the library with some form of identification and proof of local residency such as:

- A driver's license or photo ID
- An envelope or postcard recently mailed to your street address
- A utility bill that lists your street address

The minute you have your card in hand you have access to nearly 2.5 million items that you can request online. You also get HomeACCESS which links you to current magazine, newspaper, and journal articles from your home, school, or office. HomeACCESS includes the New York State Online Virtual Electronic Library (NOVEL) databases. To use HomeACCESS, visit the library's website (kinderhooklibrary.org), click on Online Research, enter the 14-digit barcode from your library card—and you're in!

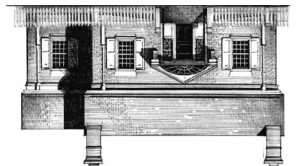
